Over the years the attendance at the ProHarvest Safety Kick Off Meetings continued to rise and so did the number of ProHarvest hats that were given away.

Jim would go out of this way to help anyone that needed help with anything while not expecting anything in return

Jim was a reserved deputy with the Tillman County Sheriff Department starting in 2001, was Captain of the reserve deputies, and to round out his career he was awarded Reserve Deputy of the Year in 2013 by the Tillman County Sheriff's Office on behalf of the Oklahoma Sheriff's Association. In 2003, he was appointed a City Councilman. Jim was currently serving as Vice Mayor of Fredrick. On top of all that Jim was a part of, he and his family also farmed 160 acres in Tillman County.

To know Jim was to love him. He had a signature smile that was contagious and no matter who you were, he was able to captivate you with one of his great stories, his arsenal of history facts, or his impeccable cooking skills. He was an avid reader, loved his guns, Labrador, and visiting Disney World. So much so that he, Joani, and Jesse made it be an annual family vacation. It was nearly impossible to walk away from a conversation with him without looking forward to the next one.

If you ever had the opportunity to meet Jim either at Frederick or at one of the U.S. Custom Harvesters Conventions, I'm sure you would agree that Jim' friendly and outgoing personality was contagious! The old saying that some people have never meet a stranger, well that was Jim!

On January 17th, 2021, in Lawton, OK, Jim Virgil Smith, succumbed to a hard-fought battle with COVID-19. Mr. Smith is survived by his adoring wife, Joani Smith, his faithful son, Jesse Smith, his loving sister, his brothers in law, his nieces, nephews, cousins, and life-long friends.
