As a child, I couldn't do much to help while on harvest, but I contributed in my own way and have gained a unique childhood. I learned to walk in Texas, attended Bible School in Oklahoma, saw my first movie (Pocahontas) in Kansas, learned to ride bike in South Dakota, and drove my first pickup in Minnesota. As I grew older, I learned how to drive combine, grain cart, and cook for a harvest crew.

In addition to harvest work, there is a harvest life that has shown me many different farming practices, the importance of being organized and how to meet new people. Being exposed to the various farming practices on harvest helped me in many of my school and civic activities. For example, with only one exception, all my 4-H projects through the years, in Crop and Soil Sciences, have involved wheat. In conclusion, the years I've been on harvest have given me friends, memories, and skills that will insure that I succeed in the future. This fall, I will be enrolled at North Dakota State University in Fargo, North Dakota, majoring in the Pre-Pharmacy program also minoring in Spanish. After I graduate from college, I plan to live near our family farm and still be involved with our family's operation.
